- Poor experiences as a result of a lack of awareness and understanding of autism by those who are in a health or social care role.
- Attending busy hospital or GP settings can be **stressful** and having access to quiet spaces could help with anxiety

- To promote reasonable adjustments

- Improve early **identification** and reducing autism diagnosis waiting times

BUILDING THE RIGHT SUPPORT IN THE COMMUNITY AND SUPPORTING PEOPLE IN INPATIENT CARE.

- Services available to provide support can have **barriers** that prevent autistic people accessing them.
- Feel that they need to reach **crisis** point before they can access support.
- The language used in some health settings can be unhelpful and can itself perpetuate the deficit way of thinking about autism.
